In every school, there is a consider-  
able number of scholars who are not  
of sufficient age and capacity to pur-  
sue the study of a science systemati-  
cally, but who are nevertheless quali-  
fied to obtain a general knowledge of  
its first principles. For the use of such  
this compilation is designed; and it is  
the opinion of the author, that in the  
exercises which it affords, the memory  
will be strengthened, the understand-  
ing improved, and an interest excited  
in the different branches of which it  
merely presents the elements, which  
cannot fail of being highly advanta-  
geous to the pupil. The lessons, it is  
true, are principally selected; but be-  
ing arranged in a regular and connect-  
ed order, and by way of question and  
answer, it is thought that the subjects  
of which they treat, will be more easily  
committed to memory and better  
understood, than in their detached  
form in separate books.

The lessons of words, with their defi-  
nitions, are introduced as exercises both  
of spelling and committing the import  
to memory. This is a highly import-  
ant part of early education, and the  
knowledge of language in general can  
not be being greatly advanced by a  
theoretical acquaintance with the com-  
prehensive dictionary which this work
